When the workers in the city of London head home each evening, a hidden legion of homeless people shuffles out of the shadows to reclaim their territory. The Square Mile has more rough sleepers than any other London borough except Westminster: 338 were identified by Broadway, a charity, over the past year, most of whom had spent more than a year on the streets. Policy makers have long struggled to find ways to shift such people, some of whom take deluded pride in their chaotic circumstances, resist offers to come in from the cold and suffer from severe drug, drink or mental-health problems.

Broadway tried a brave and novel approach: giving each homeless person hundreds of pounds to be spent as they wished. According to a new report on the project by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation, a think-tank, it worked – a success that might offer broader lessons for public-service reform and efficiency.

EXTRACT 2

I'll admit: I am a lapsed recycler. When confronted recently with an empty jar of peanut butter, rather than soak it in hot water to remove every last smear before placing it in the recycling bin, I simply tossed the jar in the trash can. In my mind, I made a quick calculation: saving the planet from one little plastic jar wasn't worth my time or the hot water necessary to clean it.

I may be wrong about that. But the fact is, I don't know what to believe anymore. I am sick of everyone telling me to "go green". I am not alone in my green fatigue. The Shelton Group's latest study revealed that between 2006 and 2007, American's enthusiasm for energy-efficient products and services fell sharply. Among its findings: the number of green or energy-efficient activities consumers said they participated in – such as recycling or riding a bike to work instead of driving – dropped from an average of 3.63 in 2006 to 3.00 last year. Furthermore, the number of respondents who considered energy efficiency "important" in deciding whether to buy a product fell from 72% to 67%.

The growing sense of green fatigue stems in part from the feeling that no matter what we do, it will never be enough. I own a Toyota Camry hybrid, have replaced roughly a third of our bulbs with compact fluorescent ones and recycle fairly religiously. Yet, judging from the daily news, the earth predicament grows only more dire.
